It's a wrap ... thank you to all those who supported us this year!

Kia koutou. Welcome to our last newsletter for 2023—we had an industrious and fruitful year and pleased to report that with a grant from *Trust Waikato* we supported our first groups of children, aged between 7-14 really struggling with reading and writing Reo English. The children from Waingaro, Huntly, Hamilton, Whatawhata, Cambridge, Raglan and Te Uku are well behind their peers for reasons ranging from: Covid-19 interruptions preventing or limiting access to specialist and academic support; neurodiversity, dyslexia, dyspraxia, dyscalculia, dysgraphia; financial costs associated with diagnosis and access to qualified tutors, practitioners, specialists and training. The scope of work in 2023 ranges from 1:1, 2:1, group, classroom, teacher professional development, training specific for the school or child's needs and whānau support. We will measure impact in two ways: 1. Practitioner/teacher literacy assessments; 2. Huber Social Impact Surveys for children and whānau. We are excited and hope to see the



curve continue to raise, childing feeling happier, feeling good about themselves and engaging positively over 2024.

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
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

Our focus in 2022 was classroom set of chrome books (pictured left) so all children have access to Google Classroom. In 2023 our focus is ensuring teachers are equipped with up-to-date technology to help carry out their work. The Food Secure Communities Programme provides support for community food providers who are working alongside people and whānau experiencing food insecurity. The programme invested in community distribution infrastructure which created significant efficiencies in the procurement and distribution of community food. Communities are also supported to develop food security plans and pilot projects to increase vulnerable communities access to affordable, nutritious, and culturally appropriate kai. Groups involved in the gardens we support wish to protect their ancestral food systems, cultural knowledge, practices, and ceremonies associated with the production, distribution and consumption of food. There is an emphasis on providing healthy and freely available kai for as many as possible.

Pictured left is a small back-yard garden over a six month period, this is the first time the kids have grown their own vegetables. We had wonderful feedback and the kids spent a lot of time photographing, watering, harvesting and eating fresh veges. Great job! Another initiative we support is Te Kuiti based Maniapoto Maara Kai Roopu Maara Kai (pictured below). The work delivered by this group also includes a budgeting cooking programme to teach people/ community how to eat healthy kai on a budget, cooking meals and preserving. All produce from this garden is donated to local foodbanks. This maara kai roopu has harvested over a staggering 4.5 ton in the past three years. We also support Intermediate and High School with over 150 students involved. Our July 2023 newsletter featured a story about the Nga Taiatea Wharekura Maara Kai Gardens—these gardens (Moko Club Ngāruawāhia photo on page 1) are on-going and we look forward to updates in 2024.

Read, Write and Spell—Professional Development with Learning Matters, Cultivating the Literacy Landscape Symposia

This event was inspiring, empowering, and motivating where we were fortunate to listen and learn from three inspiring keynote speakers; Emily Hanford, Professor Pamela Snow, and Associate Professor Lorraine Hammond. We walked away with a wealth of knowledge about the WHY, WHAT, and HOW of literacy evidence-based instruction. It is important that our team at Tui Trust understand the literacy landscape in New Zealand so we can better serve our community. PD, training and talking to teachers and leaders is a very important step. This was also a good opportunity for us to spend time with Dr Olwyn Johnston (pictured left) <u>The Kiwi Reading Doctor</u> who was one of our speakers at our *Creating a Literate Community II* conference in October. We also talked to the amazing speakers who were really interested in what Tui Trust does and why. Here is a summary of the speakers:

Emily Hanford: Why are we here? The current state of Literacy (globally) and how we've got to be where we are in 2023.

Prof. Pamela Snow: What the research tells us about how the brain learns to read, the *Science of Reading* and how we bridge research to practice. **When we know better we can do better.**

Dr Lorraine Hammond: Teaching practices that are and will lead to increased student outcomes in literacy. How can we raise the literacy rates of our most vulnerable students - practical tips.

Panel discussion guests included Professor James Chapman and talked about what is happening in New Zealand education to make change and what more is necessary. The panel discussion bridged the incredible work happening from a grass roots level and made connections to the keynote presentations. Super impressive day! The below insights link is worth a read.
